#### **NMTC Priorities**

Final outcome: Prepare a report to LADF Governing and Advisory Boards with recommended priorities for LADF's pipeline of NMTC investments.

This report should be based on research and interviews, including but not limited to:

- Interview of LADF 5-member Governing Board and 8-member Advisory Board
- Review data regarding location and industries of LADF's historical and existing portfolio.
- Identify low-income communities in the City of Los Angeles suffering from little or no new infusion of capital. #### **Small Loan Program**

Design a Small Loan Program for LADF non-NMTC capital.

#### Goals include:

- Identify appropriate local industries suffering from little or no new infusion of capital needed to expand the businesses and/or the industry. These businesses and/or industries, with LADF loan, should be able to expand services and create new jobs for low-income and/or unemployed residents of the City of Los Angeles.
- Research the capital needs of the industries/ businesses identified
- Design an appropriate loan program or programs
